recognizes the Scout for his Eagle Scout leadership service project, which is part of the requirements for earning the Eagle Scout Award. Each year, local councils select a council-level winner, and from that pool, each region selects a region-level winner. A national winner is then selected from the four regional finalists.

If you haven't already, your unit should make arrangements to take part in a worship service at your chartered organization, or, if you are sponsored by a Civic Organization, you can still participate by making arrangements with a place of worship that one of your parents or leaders attend. This is a great time to show the congregation that Scouting is a part of their community and is making a difference in the lives of our young people.

Here are some ways that Scouts can participate in a worship service: Scouts and Leaders should be in Class A Uniform, have Scouts serve as ushers. have a Scout read a scripture passage. perform a flag ceremony at the beginning of the service (if appropriate for your worship service), have Scouts

serve as altar bearers or acolytes, ask members of the congregation who were in Scouts or were Eagle Scouts to stand up and be recognized, have the troop historian present a slide presentation of vour unit's activities as eople are gathering before the service, and have the troop's chaplain's aide offer a praver during the service. Remember that **a** Scout is Reverent, and Scout Anniversary Week only comes once a year. Therefore, make every effort to participate and express the importance of participation to your Scouts and Leaders.

Professional: Logo must contain a Boy Scouts of America corporate identifier such as "BSA" without any periods, "Boy Scouts of America" or the BSA fleur-de-lis.

Theme: The 2016 Rendezvous will have a STEM theme – Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. STEM is part of an initiative the Boy Scouts of America has taken on to encourage the natural curiosity of youth members and their sense of wonder about these fields through existing programs. From astronomy to welding, Scouts cannot help but enjoy the wide range of STEMrelated activities! Your logo should incorporate a STEM theme.

Integrity: Logos cannot contain copyrighted material. Logos must have been created and edited by you. Logos may not include images or licensed images that have been previously published. Must be easily reproducible and scalable for large and small formatting.

MERIT BADGE UNIVERSITY: FEBRUARY 20, 2016

The Piedmont Council Advancement Committee would like to cordially invite your troop to participate in the 2016 Merit Badge University to be held on Saturday, February 20, 2016.

The 2016 location for MBU will be at Gaston College in Dallas, NC. Checkin will begin at 8:00 a.m.; classes will begin at 9:00 a.m. and end at 3:30 p.m. The cost for the one-day event is \$14.00 for Scouts and those adults taking classes. The fee is the same as last year and includes lunch, teaching materials for the day, and a patch.

The Boy Scout Field Uniform is the uniform of the day. Most troops refer to this as a Class A uniform.

MBU is an opportunity to learn from professionals and experts in a variety of fields. It is not intended to be an easy way to get a merit badge but rather a well-earned experience. Scout advancement works best when a scout learns, is tested, is reviewed and then recognized. To earn a badge at MBU will require scouts to participate fully and each scout must complete all requirements to earn a merit badge. Scouts who do not complete requirements at MBU will still have a chance to learn new skills and be on the way to completing the merit badge. Troops should make arrangements with MB counselors in their home area to complete any partials.

As leaders, you can help your Scouts be successful by registering them for appropriate badges. Younger scouts should be discouraged from advanced badges they may be unable to complete. Troop leaders should know the abilities of troop members and should spend the needed time prior to MBU preparing each scout for his session. Most badges have prerequisites that must be accomplished before MBU day. Please make sure the boy's do their homework, stress to your scouts the importance of working hard in class and cooperating with counselors and classmates.

Once again, this year registration for individual classes for scouts and scouters will be done online. Troops, not individual scouts or parents should do registration. Please designate one person from your troop to operate the registration process. **Classes will open February 4, at 6:00 p.m.** You can preregister now and start building your troop's roster. See website for details. Class requirements and class list are also online.



If there are any items to be completed on page 1 of the print out, then you will need to submit those items as well (for example, page 1 may say that you need to submit youth or adult applicationsdon't forget to have them signed by the appropriate people). Many recharters will not

have anything listed on page 1 and this simply indicates that there are no special issues with your recharter that need to be addressed. In addition to taking care of items on page 1, you will need to have the recharter papers signed by the appropriate individuals and submit your recharter fees. Finally, the Journey to Excellence Form for this year needs to be completed, signed, and submitted at the December Roundtable (for December Units) with your Recharter. Gerald Loftin, our Recharter Chairman. will review your recharter to ensure that you have completed everything correctly. If you submit a recharter that is incomplete or has errors, then your recharter will be delayed and will require extra work for all involved (including you, the district volunteers helping with this process, and the office staff at the Scout Office). This is why it is important that Gerald review your recharter before it is submitted. SCOUT SUNDAY AND SCOUT SABBATH

Scout Sunday will take place on Feb. 7. 2016. and is the start of Scout Anniversary week. The Scout Sabbath will be held on Saturday, Feb. 13, 2016. Your unit should make arrangements to take part in a worship service at your chartered organization or if you are sponsored by a Civic Organization, you can still participate by making arrangements with a place of worship that one of your parents or leaders attend. This is a great time to show the congregation that Scouting is a part of their community and is making a difference in the lives of our young people. Here are some ways that Scouts can participate in a worship service: Scouts and Leaders should be in Class A Uniform, have Scouts serve as ushers, have a Scout read a scripture passage, perform a flag ceremony at the beginning of the service (if appropriate for your worship service), have Scouts serve as altar bearers or acolytes, ask members of the congregation who were in Scouts or were Eagle Scouts to stand up and be recognized, have the troop historian present a slide presentation of your unit's activities as people are gathering before the service, and have the troop's chaplain's aide offer a prayer during the service. Remember that a Scout is Reverent and Scout Anniversary week only comes once a year. Therefore, make every effort to participate and express the importance of participation to your Scouts and Leaders.

2016 CAROLINA'S INDIAN SEMINAR FAQ – FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS When is CIS?

The 2016 Carolina's Indian Seminar is coming up Friday, January 22, to Sunday, January 24, 2016. This year the event will be held once again at the Mitchell Community College Continuing Education Center in Statesville.

Who Can Attend CIS?

This event is open to everyone with a desire to learn. Bring your Scout or church group or make it a family weekend. Registration starts Friday at 5:00pm – follow the signs. Uniforms are not required but appropriate attire is requested.

What happens at CIS on Friday?

The weekend begins with a Powwow on Friday night at 8:30pm. All dancers are welcome. When the MC calls for everybody to dance, you may enter the dance arena in your street clothes. It is preferable for you to wear long pants instead of shorts. This is a great opportunity to learn Powwow protocol. There are normally a number of exhibition dances on Friday night. If you haven't determined the style of dance you want to pursue, this would be an excellent opportunity to see the different outfits and dance styles. Please bring a camping type chair to sit in if you are not dancing.

Where do I stay at CIS?

Rooms are provided in the college for sleeping. There are designated classrooms for Females and Males as well as an open area in the gym. Bring your cot and/or sleeping bag. Showers are available in the gym and restrooms are available on each hall. There are a number of local hotels if you prefer to stay off-campus.

Is there food at CIS?

On Saturday, breakfast, lunch, and dinner will be provided. Breakfast will be provided on Sunday. You will receive a wristband to tell you which meal time to attend. Drinks and snacks will be available for purchase between meals.

Most people staying offsite eat breakfast at the hotel; old friends have supper at a restaurant; and many leave before breakfast on Sunday. We are trying to keep from increasing the event fee. One way to do this is to reduce the amount of food we throw away by having an accurate count for meals. Please indicate the meals you plan to eat on your registration form.

What happens at CIS on Saturday?

On Saturday, you will have the opportunity to attend as many as 5 classes starting at 9:00 am. A few classes may have a charge associated with them. An example would be an all-day class where you complete a pair of leather moccasins. Most classes, however, provide all of the materials you need free of charge.

There are approximately 125 classes available on Saturday. Everyone can find classes that suit their interests and skill level. The classes offered include outfit construction like beading, weaving, leatherwork, feather work, quill work, etc. as well as Powwow etiquette, dance styles/instruction, drumming, flute making, and basketry to name a few. The instructors travel from all over the United States to teach. They are extremely knowledgeable and always happy to answer your questions. There will be vendors available Friday through Saturday to purchase outfit materials if you just can't wait to get started on your new outfit!

The Saturday night Powwow, starting at 8:15pm, is an excellent time to show off some of the skills you acquired during the Saturday classes. We often have in excess of 200 dancers on the floor on Saturday night representing a large variety of dance styles. This is a learning Powwow. Don't be afraid to ask someone to help you with your dancing or to help you better understand Powwow protocol. Most of the young men and women you see dancing started at CIS in years past and love to show off their skills.

What happens at CIS on Sunday?

Sunday morning breakfast is served at 8:00am and will be followed by a religious service at 8:30am. Plan to leave the campus by 9:30am or 10:00am.

CIS is a wonderful place to learn new skills and make lifelong friends. If you like the seminar weekend, the AICA committee, who hosts this Powwow, holds a local dance Father's Day weekend where you can rejoin your new friends and dance all weekend. The Cabarrus Powwow Association holds a Powwow in September where you can reunite once again. In addition to these local dances, your new friends would love for you to attend the Powwows in their communities.
